

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THREE HOLY DAYS

After six weeks of spiritual focus and preparation during Lent, the Christian Year has now reached its high point. We have come to the celebration of the suffering, death, and resurrection of our Lord and Savior Jesus Christ. This is what we have been preparing for; now we see what our Savior came to do. We see him suffer and die for our sins and for the sins of the whole world, *and* we see him rise triumphantly on Easter morning to assure us that our salvation is complete and the victory is won.

The three holy days that mark this high point of the Christian year – Holy Thursday, Good Friday, and Easter Sunday – have historically been seen as a unit: one celebration in three parts. Therefore, as we celebrate these Three Holy Days, our worship will also form a unit. What follows is a *single service* celebrated over three days. It will lead us through our Savior's sufferings to his glorious triumph on Easter.

Because this service is a unit, please note the following things:

- There is no blessing to conclude worship on Holy Thursday or Good Friday. Our worship is not yet over! The blessing comes at the end of the service at Easter Dawn.
- After the Holy Thursday and Good Friday services, the congregation is asked to leave the sanctuary in silence.
- Since this worship folder will be used for all three parts of this service, please return it as you leave the sanctuary on Holy Thursday and Good Friday.

May the risen Christ bless our worship as we celebrate his suffering, death, and resurrection.

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PART 1: DIVINE SERVICE FOR HOLY THURSDAY APRIL 17, 2025, 6:30 PM

Just as Ash Wednesday begins Lent, so Holy Thursday marks the end of Lent proper and the beginning of the Three Holy Days. The theme of our celebration is the Lord's new command to his disciples of all time to love each other as he has loved us. The institution of the Lord's Supper demonstrates the depth of Jesus' love and gives power to the church to live out Jesus' command.

After we celebrate the Lord's Supper, the service will move from the upper room in Jerusalem to the Garden of Gethsemane in preparation for Good Friday. The altar, which represents the presence of Christ, becomes the focus. After the Communion table has been removed, we will solemnly strip the altar of its vestments and appointments in token of the abandonment that Jesus suffered during his passion.

As we hear our Savior's command and see him demonstrate his love for us this evening, may his love move us to love him and one another out of profound gratitude for all that he has done for us. And may his Holy Supper strengthen us with the forgiveness of sins and the newness of life that he gives us in this sacrament.

WE WILL CELEBRATE THE LORD'S SUPPER IN TODAY'S SERVICE.

St. Paul writes that everyone who receives the Lord's Supper must "recognize the body of Christ," and therefore "ought to examine themselves" (1 Cor. 11:27-29) before eating and drinking. He also writes that it is God's desire that as his people commune, they do so as "one body" (1 Cor. 10:17), "perfectly united in mind and thought" (1 Cor. 1:10). For this reason, Trinity follows the biblical and historic practice of closed (or member) communion. We welcome members of WELS or ELS congregations to commune with us. If you are not a member of a church in fellowship with Trinity, please refrain from communing today. We want nothing more than to receive the Lord's Supper with you, but we want to do so in the unity of faith that Jesus wants for his people (cf. John 17:20-23). We hope that can happen soon! Please speak to our pastor after the service, and he would be happy to further explain our practice and help you work toward full unity with us.

Confession

Brothers and sisters in Christ, in this Lenten season we have heard again how our Lord walked the path of suffering which led him to the cross for our salvation. We have also heard our Lord's call to intensify our struggle against sin, death, and the devil—all that keeps us from loving God and one another. This is the struggle to which we were committed at Baptism; God's forgiveness and the power of his Spirit to amend our lives continue with us because of his love for us in Jesus our Savior.

Within the family of the Church, God never wearies of giving peace and new life. In the absolution, we receive forgiveness as from God himself. This absolution we should not doubt but firmly believe that our sins are thus forgiven before God in heaven, for it comes to us in the name and by the command of our Lord.

We who receive God's love in Jesus Christ are called to love one another, to be servants to each other, as Jesus became our servant.

In Holy Communion, first instituted on this night, the members of Christ's body participate most intimately in his love. Remembering our Lord's Last Supper with his disciples, we eat the bread and drink the cup of this meal. Together we receive the Lord's gift of his body and blood for forgiveness and participate in that new covenant that makes us one with him and one another. The Lord's Supper is the promise of the great banquet we will share with all the faithful when our Lord returns, the joyous culmination of our reconciliation with God and each other.

As we begin the solemn celebration of our Lord's passion, let us confess our sins to him, receive his absolution, and be reconciled to God and each other in Christian love.

Holy God, gracious Father,

I am sinful by nature

and have sinned against you in my thoughts, words, and actions.

I have not loved you with my whole heart;

I have not loved others as I should.

I deserve your punishment both now and forever.

But Jesus, my Savior, paid for my sins

with his innocent suffering and death.

Trusting in him, I pray: God, have mercy on me, a sinner.

Silence for meditation and reflection

Our gracious Father in heaven has been merciful to us. He sent his only Son, Jesus Christ, who gave his life as the atoning sacrifice for the sins of the whole world. Therefore, as a called servant of Christ and by his authority, I forgive you all your sins in the name of the Father and of the + Son and of the Holy Spirit.

Amen.

Our Lord Jesus Christ has forgiven us, has reconciled us to God, and has promised us the power to forgive and love one another. Relying on his promise, therefore, be reconciled with one another.

Brothers and sisters, may the peace of Christ rule in our hearts, in our words, and in our actions.

THE WORD

The Lord be with you.

And also with you.

Prayer of the Day

Let us pray.

Lord Jesus Christ, in the Sacrament of Holy Communion, you give us your true body and blood as a remembrance of your suffering and death on a cross. Grant us so firmly to believe your words and promise that we may always partake of this sacrament to our eternal good; for you live and reign with the Father and the Holy Spirit, one God, now and forever.

Amen.







PART 2:

SERVICE OF THE SEVEN WORDS FROM THE CROSS FOR GOOD FRIDAY

APRIL18, 2025, 6:30 PM

The Service of the Seven Words from the Cross fixes our eyes on our Savior Jesus in his greatest expression of love for us. It is not a "funeral" for Jesus, but a solemn celebration of the Lamb of God and his sacrifice on our behalf. The bare altar (a symbol of Christ) is the focus, along with the large cross that hangs in our sanctuary.

The service is observed as a Service of Darkness, or in Latin *Officium Tenebrae*. The progressive extinguishing of candles represents the snuffing out of the life of Christ. After recalling the last hours of the Savior's life, we come to stand, as it were, at the foot of the cross.

The sounds and sights of the service mean to be austere and stark, but the service is never without hope and anticipation. As worship nears an end this evening, a remaining candle, a symbol of the Lord himself, is carried out of the church. The silence is broken with a loud noise—the *strepitus*—that symbolizes the rending of Christ's tomb in triumph on Easter morning. With quiet drama the candle then returns to the sanctuary. Even on Good Friday, our worship honors a *living* Christ.

The service ends in silence. The congregation hears no closing blessing in this service, because Christ's death on the cross was not the end. We eagerly wait to reassemble on Easter morning when we celebrate our Lord's triumphant resurrection.

BEFORE WORSHIP

Worshipers gather in silence. There is no preservice music.

The candelabra is lighted.

A bell tolls seven times to represent the seven words from the cross.




Improperia | Reproaches

The Improperia are a series of responses read or sung by Christians on Good Friday since the ninth century. They contrast our unfaithfulness with God's faithful love, especially as seen in Jesus' sacrifice for us on the cross.



Thus says the Lord: What have I done to you, O my people, and wherein have I offended you? Answer me. What more could have been done for my vineyard than I have done for it? When I looked for good grapes, why did it yield only bad? My people, is this how you thank your God? O my people!

O almighty God, merciful Father,

I, a poor miserable sinner, confess to you all my sins and iniquities with which I have ever offended you and justly deserved your punishment both now and forever. But I am truly sorry for my sins and sincerely repent of them, and I pray you of your boundless mercy and for the sake of the holy, innocent, bitter sufferings and death of your beloved Son, Jesus Christ, to be gracious and merciful to me, a poor sinful being.

Upon this, your confession, I, as a called servant of the Word, announce the grace of God to all of you. In the place and by the command of our Lord Jesus Christ I forgive you all your sins in the name of the Father and of the + Son and of the Holy Spirit.

This was in accordance with Jewish burial customs. ⁴¹At the place where Jesus was crucified, there was a garden, and in the garden a new tomb, in which no one had ever been laid. ⁴²Because it was the Jewish day of Preparation and since the tomb was nearby, they laid Jesus there.

SERVICE OF RESURRECTION READINGS AND SONG FOR EASTER DAWN

APRIL 20, 2025, 7:00 AM

Alleluia! Christ is risen! In the name of our risen Savior, Jesus Christ, we welcome you to Trinity Lutheran Church on this Easter morning! We pray that the message of Jesus' resurrection from the dead fills your heart with faith in Christ and confidence in his gracious gifts of forgiveness and eternal life.

In this service, we will hear the resurrection account and rejoice in his victory over death. The readings will be a harmony of the Easter Gospels that takes the details recorded by each of the Easter eyewitnesses and puts them all together in one narrative. Parts of our readings come from each of the four Gospel writers, Matthew, Mark, Luke, and John. Most of our sixth reading is taken from 1 Corinthians 15, the great "Resurrection Chapter" of the Bible.

Our worship on Holy Thursday and Good Friday has ended in silence, without a benediction or blessing, indicating that our worship was not yet complete. Today, we reach the end goal of these Three Holy Days: Jesus' resurrection, which guarantees our forgiveness, life with God, and eternal salvation. In the light of his victory, this service finally closes with the blessing that God speaks over us to put his name on us through Christ.

THE EASTER GREETING

Throughout the service, we exchange an ancient greeting used by Christians around the world. We echo the words of the angel in Matthew 28:6, "He is not here; he has risen, just as he said."
